U. S. LIBERATORS ATTACK WAKE CHICAGO-STYLE AS P-40S RAID KISKA TEN TIMES WALKER HIKES

Aleutian Base Pounded With Preinvasion Thoroness-Only One Bomber Lost in Assault On Central Pacific Isle.

Washington, July 27 .- (A. P.) - Army fighter-bombers, pounding Kiska island with preinvasion thoroness, made ten more raids on Japanese installations, the navy reported Tuesday, and this series of attacks was followed up Sunday night by an unusual single plane assault. At the same time Secretary Knox reported a flight of Liberator heavy ing off the southern headland of

bombers raided Wake island, and the harbor. It also holds strong pounded that Japanese base "prodefensive installations. miscuously and generally."

The lone night bomber which raided Kiska was a navy Catalina patrol craft, which made probably the first night assault ever delivered against the north Pacific outpost. The Catalina's bombs dropped in sleep-dispelling succession on Gertrude cove and the main camp section. Fires were started at Ger-

The ten raids Sunday and the one shortly after midnight raised to forty-one the total of air attacks on Kiska so far this month. Saturday also had been a ten-raid day. The twenty attacks Saturday and Sunday were made by Curtiss Warhawk fighters equipped with bombs. The navy offered no explanation why heavier planes were not used.

The navy communique also reported on the Wake island raid Saturday by army Liberator heavy bombers. Damage to the Japanese-held island in the central Pacific was considerable. The raid destroyed nine fighters of thirty which attempted to intercept. Four other Zeros were listed as probably destroyed, five others were damaged.

Navy communique No. 451 said: 'Central Pacific.

"1-On July 24, army Liberator (Consolidated B-24) heavy bombers attacked Wake island. Thirty Zero fighters intercepted, of which nine were destroyed, four were probably destroyed and five others damaged.

ONLY ONE BOMBER LOST ON WAKE RAID.

"2-The United States planes on closer approach to the island were met by additional fighters and heavy anti-aircraft fire. In spite of this opposition the United States bombers scored many hits and caused a large explosion on the runway. One United States plane is missing.

"North Pacific.

"3-On July 25, army Warhawk (Curtiss P-40) fighters carried out ten bombing attacks on Japanese installations at Kiska. At North Head hits were scored on the runway and anti-aircraft positions, the main camp, North Head, and Little Kiska were also strafed. Fires started at Little Kiska and a large explosion was observed on North

"4-On July 26, shortly after midnight, a United States Catalina (Consolidated PBY) patrol bomber attacked Gertrude cove and the main camp section of Kiska. Fires

The Gertrude cove sector which the lone navy patrol bomber attacked has been frequently bombed and bombarded. It was the usual target of surface ships in their seven raids on Kiska so far this

Wake island had been raided half a dozen times before.

As for an estimate of damage on the latest attack, the navy secretary said simply that "we hit the island promiscuously and generally."

The Berlin radio had said Monday that the raid had been made, attributing the report to a Tokyo
